## American tin mission leaves U.S. next week

WASHINGTON, Sat.

AN American tin mission invited to Singapore and Malaya by the British and Malayan Governments plans to leave next week. It will arrive in Singapore about a week later for a two-week tour of tin-producing areas.

The invitation was extended to U.S. Government tin experts at the suggestion of the Chamber of Mines of the Federation. The idea is to give Americans "a better understanding of Malayan tin production and marketing problems."
