Several passports belonging to Indonesians recovered

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"We hope this demolition exercise will prove to the villagers that we sincerely care for their health and safety," he said.

Prior to this, the committee had expressed its concern over the presence of Indonesian immigrants to the Sepang District Council, police, Rela, Sepang MP Seripah Noli Syed Hussin and Dengkil State Assemblyman Datuk Sharif Jajang.

During the exercise which ended at 12.30pm today, Government per-

sonnel recovered several passports and household goods belonging to the Indonesians.

The legitimacy of the passports could not be ascertained as yet.

Since this problem was highlighted in the Press last week, police have stepped up vigilance in the area.

They have since arrested 62 Indonesians and Bangladeshis in Putrajaya, Cyberjaya and in Kampung Limau Manis for not having valid travel documents.

A spokesman from Tenaga Na-

sional Berhad said Tenaga had issued a notice to the settlers to refrain from building shelters under their cables.

However, the spokesman said they were unable to act against the settlers because the land they were living on did not belong to Tenaga.

Under Tenaga regulations, no houses can be built under the cables.

Sepang police chief Deputy Superintendent Mohd Shukri Dahlan said the demolition went on without any incident.
