

Mr. Jackson, the Judicial Commissioner, has been spending the whole of this week in the Negri Sembolan, and while in Seremban was the guest of Mr. Wise at the Residency.

On Monday and Tuesday Mr. Jackson held Court in Seremban, and we were very pleased to hear he gave the raiders who had attacked and plundered the Gambling Farm at Sekamit, pretty stiff sentences; three men got life sentences, one man ten years, and the rest five years' penal servitude. These sentences will keep these gentlemen out of mischief for some time, and ought to act as a deterrent to other intending highwaymen.

There was a very lively scene in the court when the sentences were announced to the prisoners, who immediately all clung together arms and legs entwined, screaming and yelling, and had to be forcibly separated by the Police, who made free use of the handy "lowchang."

On Wednesday Mr. Jackson proceeded to Jelebu to try a case there returning to Seremban later in the week, and leaving again on Sunday for Malacca and Tampin where he has another case. Mr. Vernon Page has also been to Jelebu.

The Kajang Seremban line is really getting on and the first of the new stations, namely Bangee, about twentytwo minutes by rail on the Seremban side of Kajang, has been declared open for traffic. This reminds us that only a very short time ago, we heard that shop-keepers, apparently, found it cheaper to get their stuffs brought to Seremban either by steamer to Malacca, and from that port on by bullock cart to Seremban, a distance of over-miles; or else by steamer to Kuala Klang, from thence by rail to Kajang, and from Kajang to Seremban by road, as long strings of bullock carts were constantly seen on this latter route conveying goods to the aforementioned town, can only conclude that this method of transport is adopted, on account of high rates on the S. U. R. Surely it would pay the Company to keep all this goods traffic in their hands by lowering their rates.
