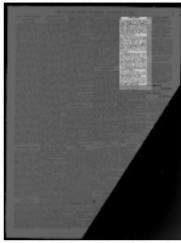




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## F.M.S. NOTES.

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### F.M.S. NOTES.

A HAMADRYAD, 18 feet in length, which was responsible for all the missing poultry belonging to the villagers in Cheras, a small mukim about four miles from Kajang, was luckily despatched after a feed of a big goat but not until after it had received three shots from a Malay resident there, in addition to a blow with a parang. The carcass was brought to the Kajang Police Station for the usual reward.

Wowkay Wong Yiew, a very successful miner of Kuala Kubu, who made his fortune quite recently, has passed away. It is believed that he was attacked with bubonic plague. Several cases of that disease have appeared there, and stringent measures are being taken by the authorities to prevent its spread. On 23rd ult. there was a procession amid the firing of crackers and loud music by the Chinese to ward off the disease.

Captain Adam paid a visit to Kajang and inspected the Volunteers of that place on parade at the Padang. Photographs were taken by local amateurs.

Tigers are in evidence at Kajang. The other night, one of Mr. Stonor's dogs was badly mauled, and Mr. Moulins' two dogs were killed, one of which was carried away. A goat in the hospital compound was also carried away.

A live half grown panther was caught in a trap at Cheras the other day, and brought in to Kajang.
