Annual General Meeting at Kuala Lumpur.

(From Our Own Correspondent). Kuala Lumpur, March 10.

At the annual general meeting of the Sungei Ramal Syndicate, Ltd., the Hon. Mr. Kindersley, presiding, said, inter alia: At last year's meeting I said that the previous year had been the worst on record for the rubber industry and the future outlook was gloomy in the extreme. I very nearly had to repeat the statement this year, but restriction by legislation of the export of rubber from November 1, 1922, saved the situation. If restriction had been introduced in January, 1921, when asked for, an enormous sum of money would have been saved this country and the British Empire.
